## A PLATFORM FOR EMPOWERING BUSINESSES, IDEAS & INNOVATIONS

From Thursday, October 2nd, Rukurato Grounds in Hoima City transformed into a bustling arena of trade, ideas, and cultural expression as the Kabalega Business and Innovation Expo officially opened.

The three-day fair aimed to promote local enterprise, youth innovation, and cultural creativity, while also serving as a public interface for health education, financial literacy, and community engagement.

Attendees, from small-scale vendors and artisans to large corporates – found common ground in showcasing what community-driven innovation could look like.

## AS IT HAPPENED..

Over 30 exhibitors set up booths at the expo, representing a wide spectrum of sectors. Youth-led startups displayed their solutions addressing agriculture, health, sanitation, and education. Cultural artisans presented traditional crafts, herbal products, and memorabilia that drew attention to Bunyoro’s vibrant heritage.

Corporate sponsors like Roofings Uganda, Centenary Bank, Pepsi Uganda, Jibu Water, and Roke Telkom activated their own branded spaces, offering product demos, giveaways, and interactive sessions that created both buzz and foot traffic.

# WHERE CULTURE MET COMMERCE



Prominent government parastatal institutions and organizations also showcased their services in a way that added real-time value to attendees. Konrad Adenauer Stiftung (KAS) facilitated civic education and dialogue around governance and digital citizenship, through multimedia display and information sharing.

National Identification Registration Authority (NIRA) helped attendees access on-site national ID services. Uganda Business Registration Services (URSB) supported the community with on-site real-time business registration services, while Uganda Bureau of Statistics (UBOS) engaged the public in data and statistics literacy, as well as national census awareness.

In parallel, the Community Health Pavilion, organized by the Uganda Red Cross, Medical Teams, City Medicals, and UBTS offered a full range of free services including HIV testing, general check-ups, counseling, and blood donation.

At the heart of Kabalega Independence Week is a vision for Community Transformation as the event draws various stakeholders united to explore solutions for local progress.

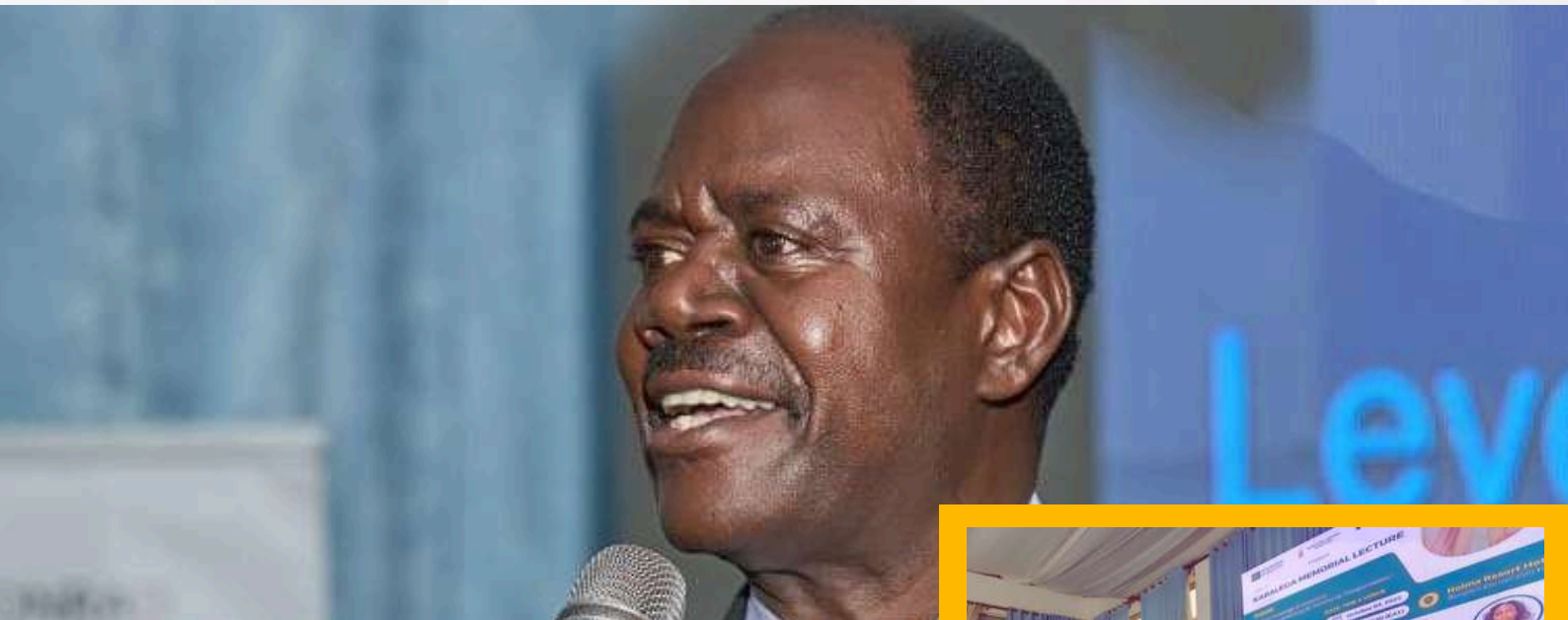

# THE 2<sup>ND</sup> KABALEGA MEMORIAL LECTURE

*A Reflection on Leadership Pathways for Community Transformation through Culture, Knowledge, and Innovation*



## A REFLECTION ON A HERO'S LEGACY

**October 3, 2025**

On the third day of Kabalega Independence Week, Hoima slowed down—not in pace, but in posture. The energy shifted from music and marketplaces to quiet thought and meaningful dialogue as a multi-generational crowd gathered for the 2nd Kabalega Memorial Lecture, hosted at Hoima Resort Hotel.

Under the theme “Culture, Knowledge & Innovation: Reimagining Leadership for Community Transformation,” the event felt less like a traditional lecture and more like a collective reflection—a search for authentic, homegrown solutions to Uganda’s most pressing leadership and development challenges.

# THE 2<sup>ND</sup> KABALEGA MEMORIAL LECTURE

This landmark event was organized by Kabalega Foundation in partnership with the Bunyoro-Kitara Kingdom, and supported by Konrad Adenauer Stiftung, long recognized for its work in democracy, governance, and civic education.

## A Reflection on the Past, Present, and Future

The event opened with traditional music, and dance—not as cultural decoration, but as a grounding reminder of what came before governance: community, rhythm, and meaning.

## A Call for Empathetic, Inclusive Leadership

Speaking on behalf of Konrad Adenauer Stiftung (KAS), Mr. Bernard Mukhone brought a thoughtful lens to the conversation, challenging the audience to reimagine what leadership could—and should—look like in Africa today. How do we build leaders who truly serve all people, including marginalized communities?" he asked.

"His answer: leaders must listen deeply, respect the histories of their people, and have the courage to ask how things can be done differently.

He emphasized the importance of education and democratic dialogue as cornerstones of accountable leadership. True transformation, he said, requires partnerships—between traditional and modern institutions, between civil society and government, and between local wisdom and global ideas.

"As we honor the legacy of Kabalega today," he said, "let us also commit to nurturing a new generation of leaders who are not only visionary, but also empathetic, inclusive, and innovative."

Mr. Mukhone closed by reaffirming KAS's support for initiatives like the Kabalega Memorial Lecture, which provide platforms for critical thinking and shared vision. "Leadership must be a force for dignity and transformation for all," he concluded—a sentiment that echoed the purpose of the day.

## KEY TAKEAWAYS FROM THE KEYNOTE ADDRESS & DISCUSSION

### "What if leadership isn't about power—but about purpose?"

That was the question posed by keynote speaker Professor Julius Kiiza, who delivered a hard-hitting, deeply thoughtful address. Drawing from African history, economic trends, and personal experience, Professor Kiiza reminded the room that Omukama Kabalega was not just a historical figure—but a model of transformative leadership for today.

Kabalega was a monarchist who believed in leadership that was rooted, responsive, and forward-looking. His style mirrored what modern military science now calls "mission command"—leadership with clear vision, local accountability, and community involvement.

**"Leadership is not about occupying space," Professor Kiiza said. "It's about catalyzing change."**

He warned against rulers who rule for ego, not outcomes; against systems that reward mediocrity and stunt innovation; and against mindsets that confuse culture with stagnation.

### THE PANEL DISCUSSION

With a panel of diverse representation moderated by Dr. Cindy Evelyn Magara, it delved into real conversations about what leadership means today, and where it must go.

- **Owek. David F.K. Mpanga**, who also represented the Prime Minister of Buganda Kingdom at the event spoke passionately about the continuing role of cultural institutions in shaping modern governance—not by resisting progress, but by guiding it with integrity and identity.
- **Dr. Lenard Nalubo**, a leading AI researcher and founder of the Bunyoro Development Think Tank, urged the audience to stop seeing technology as a foreign concept, and emphasized the role of AI and digital innovation in preserving culture—from 3D scanning of heritage sites to digital storytelling in native languages. He called for tech centers in industrial parks, stronger digital infrastructure, and tools to ensure Africa becomes not just a user of technology—but a creator of it.
- **Ms. Nancy Kalembe**, a former presidential candidate, shared the challenges of navigating male-dominated spaces as a woman, offering both critique and hope for more inclusive, empathetic leadership.
- **Mr. Innocent Turyahikayo**, a youth leader, was blunt, raising critical question: "Who is truly there for the youth?" Despite young people making up the majority of Uganda's population, they often remain sidelined in key decisions and development initiatives.
- He posed a vital question to the audience: **"Who is mentoring our young people to become the leaders of tomorrow?"**
- Innocent commended Kabalega Foundation for its forward-thinking initiative to establish the Kabalega Institute of Leadership & Cultural Studies (KILCS), expressing optimism that this platform will significantly contribute to nurturing youth leadership and driving sustainable development across the region.

## REMARKS BY KABALEGA FOUNDATION

Prince Dr. James Isagara Kisoro - The Foundation's Executive Director's remarks tied together the event's themes with a hopeful call to action:

*"We believe this platform can be leveraged—just as we have always said in our communications—to draw inspiration from a hero's legacy to drive social, cultural, and economic transformation within our society."*

He urged attendees, especially youth, to see culture as a foundation, not a hindrance:

*"By holding our heritage close while embracing technological advancements, we open ourselves to new opportunities. Culture and innovation are not enemies—they are partners in progress."*

*“The Kabalega Institute of Leadership and Cultural Studies is a commitment to nurture leadership and culture as vital lessons for societal progress. Let us all take part in making this vision a reality.” said Dr. Kisoro*

*“We don’t want these ideas to end in this room,” said Dr. Kisoro.*

*“KILCS will be a platform for research, leadership training, cultural preservation, and youth mentorship—all grounded in African realities.”*

*The Kabalega Institute of Leadership & Cultural Studies aims to:*

- Train leaders across political, cultural, and entrepreneurial sectors
- Promote indigenous knowledge systems and cultural preservation
- Provide ethical tech education with African context
- Engage youth in meaningful, values-based community development.

The launch received enthusiastic support from the Bank of Uganda, Kingdom representatives, and development partners in the room.

By grounding its training programs in indigenous values and real-world challenges, the institute aims to bridge the gap between traditional wisdom and modern governance, with a vision of nurturing leaders who are not only competent in policy and management but also deeply rooted in cultural identity and social responsibility.

Through emphasis on cultural preservation and the promotion of indigenous knowledge systems, the institute aims to reinforce the idea that sustainable progress must be anchored in the values and practices that define African societies and its realities.

Furthermore, by integrating ethical technology education and youth mentorship into its programs, KILCS positions itself as a hub for innovation and inclusive growth and seeks to inspire a new generation of leaders and thinkers—guiding a future that is technologically advanced, ethically sound, and culturally confident.

## A LEGACY, REVISITED BY FAMILY AND FUTURE LEADERS

The evening also featured emotional moments from Kabalega's descendants, including Prince John Nyabongo Olimi, a 2nd generation descendant, and former Chief Prince of Bunyoro-Kitara who reminded the audience that Kabalega founded one of the earliest leadership academies in Galuhuma, in present day Mwenge—long before modern governance structures took shape.

*"If others can preserve culture while advancing AI—so can we. China does it. The Arab world does it. We don't have to lose ourselves to progress.*

*I thank my young brother, Dr. Kisoro for setting up such platforms to honor the legacy of our grandfather and for reflection on his legacy for transformation of today's society"* Prince John Nyabongo Olimi noted.

## DINNER, FILM & FORWARD MOTION

The day concluded with a dinner that created a warm, relaxed atmosphere for informal networking and reflection. Participants shared ideas, built new connections, and exchanged perspectives on the day's discussions in an environment that encouraged openness and collaboration.

The evening ended with the screening of the short film "Call 112 – The Truth and Nothing But the Truth" by Konrad Adenauer Stiftung.

The film provided a sobering reflection on the realities of the information age—where misinformation and half-truths often cloud public understanding. The screening left participants with a deeper appreciation of integrity as a cornerstone of social harmony, progress, and development.

## FIVE BIG IDEAS THAT EMERGED

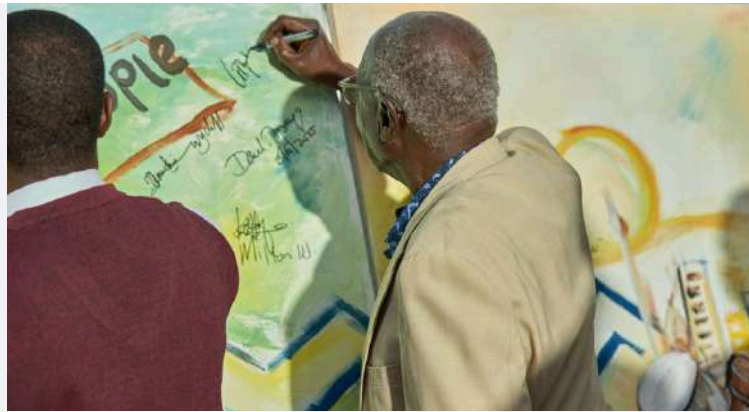
From all the voices, a few key themes rang loud and clear:

1. Unify Over Fragmentation
2. Reinvent regional leadership by recombining splintered districts.
3. Revive Ubuntu
4. Leadership must be humane, community-first, and dignity-based.
5. Invest in Innovation, Not Just Employment
6. Move youth beyond boda-bodas. Build coders, engineers, thinkers.
7. Cultural Institutions Are Development Partners
8. Use them for public health, agriculture, and education.
9. Youth Inclusion Must Be Structural
10. Culture, education, and leadership must be accessible—not ornamental.

The grand finale of Kabalega Independence Week took to the streets on Saturday, October 4th with the Kabalega Independence Run 2025, an energetic display of unity, wellness, and national pride. Organized by Kabalega Foundation in collaboration with a host of sponsors and partners, local leadership, and Bunyoro-Kitara Kingdom, the run drew over 1,500 participants from within and the region and across Uganda.

The event featured three main race categories – a 2KM family-friendly walk/run, a 5KM fun run, and a challenging 10KM competition that saw professional athletes and local champions competing for top prizes. The route meandered through scenic parts of Hoima City, lined with cheering residents, cultural performances, and hydration stations.

From senior citizens and schoolchildren to UPDF personnel and government officials, the diversity of runners symbolized collective ownership of Kabalega’s vision of sovereignty, health, and self-reliance.

In his opening remarks by Dr. James Isagara Kisoro, Executive Director of the Kabalega Foundation, reminded participants that the run was not just a sporting activity, but a living expression of liberation and transformation, with this year’s edition focused on supporting youth innovation.

Hoima City Mayor His Worship Brian Kaboyo commended the organizing team for integrating health, heritage, and hope into a unifying community activity. Other members of the royal family, notably, Princesses Daphne, Doreen, and Oliver joined Dr. Isagara Kisoro to flag off the run.

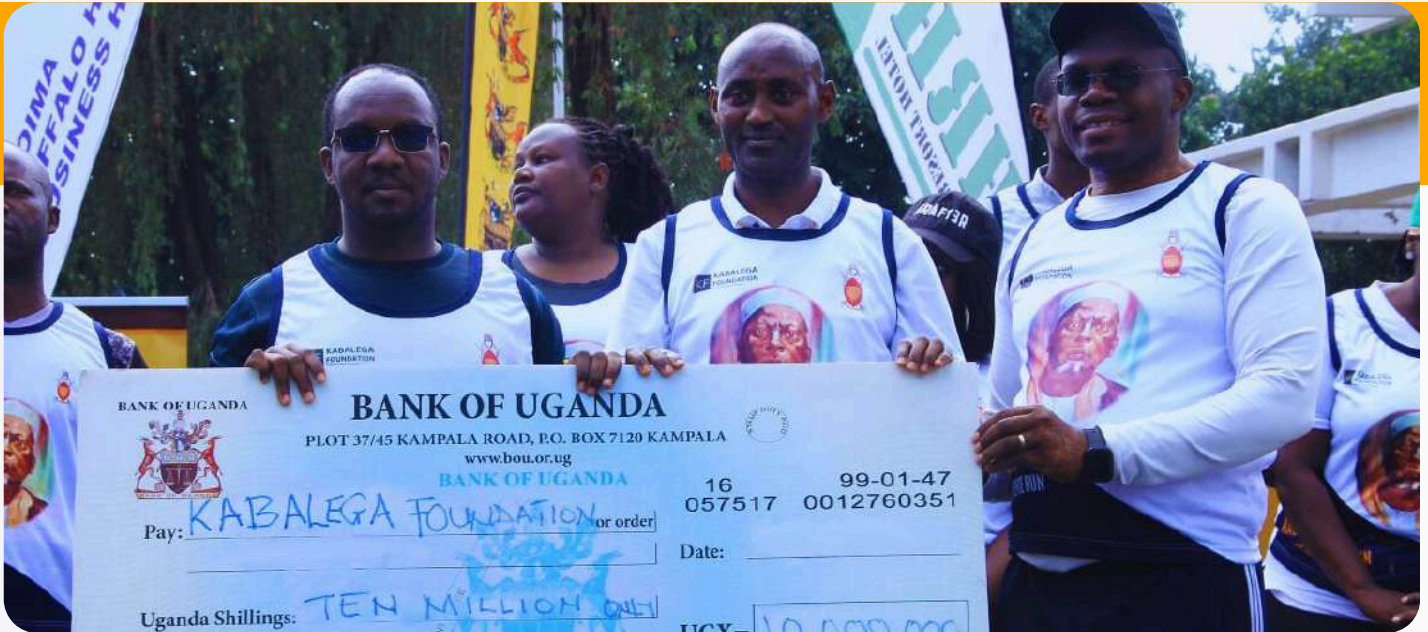

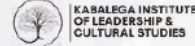
